Want to save up to £500 each year? –Get Online

What is all this 'Online' and 'Internet'?

There is a huge network that connects lots of computers together around the world so that you and I could talk or pass messages when we are miles apart. Almost all shops and businesses are connected so we can buy things from them. It is called 'The Internet', and 'The Web', and 'Being Online' is when you use it.

And where does the £500 come in?

You are:

- Paying more for many goods because they are cheaper if you buy them online and you can easily shop around without having to visit all the shops
- Missing out on better savings rates because they are only offered if you are online
- Paying extra costs for having paper bills and bank statements
- Missing out on the best electricity and gas rates because you can't find them

But is it really £500?

Lloyds Bank did a survey called The Consumer Digital Index 2016 and worked out it could cost you £500 to £700 a year if you weren't online.

What else can I do?

- ✓ It is easy to keep in touch with friends and relatives:
 - You can have free telephone and video calls with them
 - You can send them short messages and longer ones called emails
 - You can share photos
- ✓ It is easy to find basic health information and advice without needing to wait for a doctor's appointment
- ✓ Follow up on your hobby:
 - Recipes for any dish you fancy
 - Answer those gardening questions
 - Research your family history
- ✓ Sort out your money at any time of the day or night, see if it has gone into your bank account, without having to go out
- ✓ Play games for fun, either against yourself or with others you know. Many games will find you someone to play against:
 - Crosswords, Solitaire, Chess, Bridge, Scrabble
- ✓ Buy your groceries online and have them delivered
